

Scorpius, or "the scorpion," was sent to battle Orion, a hunter in ancient Greek mythology. When the two killed each other, Zeus, the god of the sky, placed Orion in the winter sky and Scorpius in the summer sky, so as to separate them forever. Scorpius can be seen in the southern summer sky.
