WHY BUILD A COLLEGE PORTFOLIO?


Along with requiring transcripts and essays, college admissions officers are looking for your unique personality and interests to shine. A college portfolio highlights your:



WHERE SHOULD I START?

Start by gathering your resources! Taking inventory of what you'd like to share with a college admissions officer will help you make the rest of the portfolio come together.

First, do your research to find out exactly what your prospective college is looking for. If the college already has portfolio requirements, make sure you've included any and every special request.



Include pieces that speak to your **personality and passions**. Your portfolio should simply highlight your top interests and skills.
